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Cdr. R. K. White July 1969 — May 1971

Commander Robert K. White, CEC, USN, served as commanding officer of U.S. Naval Mobile Construction Battalion Forty from July, 1969, to May, 1971.

Commander White, an 18 year veteran, was born in Glen Falls, New York, in 1930. His elementary and secondary educations were completed there when he graduated from Glen Falls High School in 1948.

He entered Northwestern University, Evanston, Illinois, under the Naval Reserve Officer Training Corps Program. He graduated from that institution in 1953, receiving a Bachelor of Science in Civil Engineering degree and was commissioned an Ensign in the Navy's Civil Engineer Corps.

Prior to assuming command of MCB 40, Commander White had been assigned to a number of duties highlighted by service in Korea with Construction Battalion Maintenance Unit 101, 1953-54, and, with Mobile Construction Battalion Special attached to Operation Deep-freeze, 1956-58. While attached to "Deepfreeze" Cmdr. White wintered over at Little America V (1956-57). While assigned to CBMU-101 Cmdr. White was awarded the United Nations Service and Korean Service Medals. While he was with Construction Battalion Special he was awarded the Antarctic Service Medal. He also has been awarded the National Defense and Expert Pistol medals.

Commander White attended the Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute (1958-59) and received a Master of Science in Civil Engineering in 1959. He also attended the School of Naval Command and Staff Naval War College, Newport, Rhode Island (1968-69).

Commander White, a registered Professional
Engineer (Illinois), is married to the former Marcia
Bates of Rockport, Massachusetts.

Commander Daniel W. Urish, CEC, USN, assumed command of U.S. Naval Construction
Battalion Forty in May, 1971. He relieved Cmdr.
Robert K. White, CEC, USN, while we were deployed in Diego Garcia, Indian Ocean.

An 18 year Navy Veteran, Cmdr. Urish was born in Pekin, Illinois, December 27, 1930. He graduated from the University of Illinois with a B.S. degree in Civil Engineering in 1954. In 1964 he earned an M.S. degree in Hydrology at the Univ. of Washington.

Prior to assuming command of NMCB-40, Cmdr. Urish was assigned as staff engineer and Real Estate Officer for the Joint Military Assistance and Advisory Command in Thailand.

"For Forty and the supporting units of the Island Command, the building of the first Naval facility in the Indian Ocean from scratch was a great adventure and a proud privilege. The pride of beating that first deadline, the interim runway construction, and the thrill of seeing the first plane touch down will long be remembered. Also to be remembered is that our success was a Navy Team Effort. It was not the achievement of a single man or unit, but the hard work, skill and dedication of every man on the island."

It was my special privilege to have assumed command of Forty from Captain White. I could never have found a finer and more capable group of men than I had with me on Diego Garcia. By the winning of the Navy "E" for Best of Type, you have proven once again that "Fighting Forty" is "not the best, but the Very Best." My deepest appreciation for a difficult job well done."






GARCIA!









For more than 400 years, the tiny Indian Ocean island of Diego Garcia was just a sleepy little place in the sun.

Nothing much more exciting than the arrival of a boat to take the island's principal produce, the coconut, to market.

Under the terms of a bilateral agreement, between the United States and United Kingdom governments, signed in 1966, NMCB-40 was assigned to turn a coconut tree covered island into an austere naval communications facility.

Huge lumbering earth movers and 15-ton trucks quickly took over secluded jungle trails which formerly had seen nothing other than donkey carts and a few small tractors used by the coconut workers.

Because Diego Garcia is in such an isolated location, few men had ever seen or heard of the island, and almost no one was aware of its colorful, interesting history.

Diego Garcia is one of 52 islands which make up the Chagos Archipelago. Spread out over an area of 120 miles, the Chagos is located in the heart of the Indian Ocean, about 1200 miles south of India.

In the past, under both French and British rule, the island has been used primarily for coconut plantations. In addition, a coaling station and phosphate mine operated at one time.

One plantation remained in operation until late July, 1971. The East Point plantation, owned by the Chagos Agalega Company. It was managed from 1965 until its closing by Mr. Marcel Moulinie', nephew of the owner.

In 1966 the island was made a part of the British Indian Ocean Territories (BIOT). After that time, Mr. Moulinie' worked for BIOT as plantation manager.

About 350 people, most of them from the Seychelles, were employed at the East Point Plantation. They picked about 100 tons of coconuts per month for export to India.

A number of donkeys now run wild on the island. They were first brought in by the plantation owners for use as work animals.

During the early part of World War I, the island had an unexpected, unwelcomed, German visitor. A German raider, the cruiser Emden, made what was her last port call ever to Diego Garcia.

Her crew forced plantation workers to cut wood for her at gunpoint. She was sunk a short time later on the reefs of the Cocos Islands.

An Indian garrison of British troops was stationed on Diego Garcia during World War II. They manned huge guns which can still be seen today on the north side of the island near the present Seabee camp. But, there was very little, if any, enemy activity in the area.

Until the early 1950's, the island was used as a coaling station for ships traveling from Australia and Indonesia to the Seychelles and Mauritius. And until as late as 1961, phosphates were mined for export to Mauritius, New Zealand, and Australia.


Private yachts will stop off at the island on their way from Australia or Indonesia to the Seychelles or Mauritius. An average of eight yachts a year make a port call at Diego Garcia. They belong usually to persons from the United States or Australia who use the island as a natural stopping point about midway in their journey on the southeast trade winds.

Diego Garcia is no longer just a forgotten speck on the map.

While its history of coconut plantations is over, NMCB-40 Seabees are adding new pages to its history each day, while turning it into an important link in the Navy's communications network.


The deployment of Civic Action Team (CAT/TRUK) coincided with many significant events in the history of the Truk District and of Micronesia. Typhoon Amy crossed the Truk Lagoon while the CAT was in Guam for in-briefing and the Truk District was just starting to recover from the worst typhoon in its recorded history when the CAT arrived on Moen. The CAT was also on site to participate in the funeral of the late Chief Petrus Maillo, a great friend of the Civic Action Program. Among the many projects Seabee Team 4005 participated in these are most noteworthy:

- Moen Is. constructed a fish packing and distribution center.
- Moen Is. constructed a drainage system along Moen Perimeter Road between Penisene and Sapuk to enable upgrading of the road.
- Dublon Is. Rebuilt and made operational a causeway that had been severely damaged during the bombing of Dublon.















4006

Seabee Team 4006 deployed to the Republic of Vietnam on 1 May 1971. The team arrived at its deployment site on 7 May 1971, in Tan An City, Long An Province. The general scope of the work included construction of schools, bridges, footbridges, latrines, road upgrading, culvert installations, a sanitary hamlet program, and a mass immunization program.

Specifically, Seabee Team 4006 was responsible for the construction of five bridges in Tan Chanh Village, which opened up the peninsula to automotive traffic, thus improving transportation, communications, marketing, and overall security of the area.

Also completed was construction of an eight room classroom (two-story) in Tan An City utilized by well over 1400 students.

SBT 4006 also replaced a bridge destroyed by the Viet Cong in 1966, with a footbridge, thus enabling forty families to return to their long abandoned ancestral homes, and rich rice lands.

The SBT corpsman was always busy, participating in the sanitary hamlet program, as well as the massive immunization program.

4006 was also responsible for grading well over 50 kilometers of road.


