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



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## FORTY'S HISTORY



The Fortieth Naval Construction Battalion was commissioned at Davisville, Rhode Island, in October 1942 with Commander I. S. Rasmusson, CEC, USN as Commanding Officer.

After a brief training period, the battalion boarded a transport ship and sailed to New Hebrides for duty. The battalion arrived at Espirito Santo Island on February 3, 1943, with the assignment to build a bomber air strip at Luganville. Despite the fact that the entire job site was solid coral, the project was completed in 120 days. After completing its work, the battalion departed for New Guinea in November 1943.

Projects completed in New Guinea included a 17,000 man staging area including berthing and mess facilities, 14 LST ramps, and 15 miles of two-lane highway including many timber bridges.

In March 1944, an advance party of the 40th NCB landed with the first echelon of the 4th Construction Brigade and the Army's first reinforcements to the beach assault troops at Hyane Harbor, Los Negros Island in the Admiralties.

Forty's unit, along with others, turned back three enemy attacks that resulted in 168 dead and 24 captured. For the action, NCB Forty was awarded the Army Unit Citation.

The battalion's next stop was Okinawa, where two Navy-Marine Corps Medals and four Purple Hearts were presented. After building the nearest airfield to the Japanese home islands, the 40th Naval Construction Battalion was officially decommissioned.

On February 1, 1966, the 40th Naval Construction Battalion was officially recommissioned as the United States Naval Mobile Construction Battalion Forty under the command of Commander B. L. Saravia, CEC, USN. Commander Saravia programmed military and technical training for officers and enlisted personnel which continued throughout the homeport period.

In July 1966, NMCB 40 went on its first of three deployments to Vietnam. The first two deployments were to Camp Shields at Chu Lai. On the first deployment to Camp Shields, the battalion completed a crosswind runway for the Chu Lai airfield. For its efforts, the battalion was given the Best of Type award for the fiscal year of 1967. The second deployment to Camp Shields was under the command of Commander William F. Daniel CEC, USN. Their main goal was to build a Class V ammunition storage area.

The third deployment was to Phu Bai, Vietnam in December of 1968. Their job was to pave and to upgrade Route QL-1 and make it an all-weather road for transportation along the whole length of Vietnam.

Forty then made its first peacetime deployment to Puerto Rico. Also, there were detachments as far north as Argentia, Newfoundland, as far south as Panama, and across the Atlantic to the Azores. The jobs to be done were to construct a rock crusher and an Asphalt plant, Officers and CPO mess facilities, additions to Roosevelt Roads Naval Hospital and telephone exchange, and providing a recreation facility for ships visiting the Roosevelt Roads Naval Complex.

NMCB 40 returned to homeport in September 1970 to start training for the most unusual and the most challenging deployment given to a Seabee battalion since World War II. The deployment was to the island of Diego Garcia in the Indian Ocean. The battalion was to build a 900 man Seabee camp, roads, desalination plants for fresh water, a 5500 foot C-130 runway, and begin the construction of the permanent communications facilities. The runway was completed and received its first plane on the 19th of July, 1971. In August, Forty was given the Best of Type award for the year of 1972.

#### DETINGUISHED UNIT CITATION 40TH CONSTRUCTION BATTALION UNITED STATES NAVY

The 40th Construction Battalion, United States Navy, is cited for outstanding performance of duty in action against the enemy on Los Negros Island, Admiralty Froup, on 2 March 1944. This unit landed during a critical situation when the holding of the harbor and airstrip against overwhelming enemy forces was precarious. Notwithstanding the fact that the area was still under enemy fire, the battalion immediately on landing assumed its assigned work in clearing and repairing the airstrip. During the progress of their work it became commonplace for the operators to be fired upon by snipers, and for the operators to return the fire while continuing their work. It soon became evident that cavalry patrols operating against the enemy required cleared fire lanes into the jungle to permit concentration of automatic weapons fire against the enemy, and the 40th Construction Battalion had no sooner learned of this need then they turned their bulldozers into the jungle, cut the required fire lanes in superb disregard of the enemy fire, and established adequate areas for the control of the enemy. During the hours of darkness the members of the battalion were continously harassed by infiltrating ene.ny patrols, and for their own preservation operated effectively as combat troops. After working all day and fighting all night, small parties of the 40th Construction Battalion personnel still found time during their few hours of leisure off duty to rout out small bands of the enemy, locate and report pillboxes, and otherwise carry the offensive to the enemy's positions. The cheerful and uncomplaining attitude of these engineers and the outstanding esprit were noticeable to all associated with the unit and gave great encouragement to the troops in contact. In particular, the operation of the bulldozers into the test of the enemy's positions was most inspiring and heartening, and created an immediate resurgence of the offensive spirit in weary troops.







# GUAM IS GOOD

# GUAM

#### 1) TWO LOVERS POINT

Guam's most impressive lookout is an island landmark. An ancient Chamorro legend lends the point its name. According to island folklore, a Guamanian maiden was deeply in love with her Chamorro lover. Her parents objected to her choice, and attempted to force her to marrf an old Spanish captain. The young lovers escaped to the top of the cliff and jumped to the sea far below with their long hair tied together.

#### 2 LATTE PARK, AGANA

Among the many relics and mounments dotting the island of Guam, the ancient Latte Stones are perhaps the most fascinating, as their original purpose still remains somewhat of a mystery.

They are believed to have been used as supports for thatched roofs by the ancient Chamorro inhabitants. The massive pillars of stone are topped by a separate

headstone ("Tasa").
Archaeologists believe many still undiscovered latte

sites remain buried in Guam's jungles.

The latte are only one of Guam's unique relics of the past.

#### PASEO de ESPANA, AGANA

This beautifully landscaped area of Agana offers a glimpse of Guam's Spanish heritage. It was the seat of the Spanish government on the island for 230 years. The grounds contain the "Chocolate House", where the guests were served hot chocolate in the Spanish tradition; a garden, and the spans of an old Spanish archway, built in 1736.

The adjoining Guam Museum is interesting not only for its display of articles pertaining to Guam's pastit is an example of old Spanish building methods.

#### YPAO and IPAN BEACHES

The Ypao Beach on Tumon Bay is one of the most popular on Guam and its fine, white sands contrast with the clear, blue-green waters of the Bay. Guam's most modern hotels are strung along Tumon Bay. Ipan Beach is a short drive across the island and away from the busier areas of Guam. Most visitors love to swim and picnic at Ipan.

#### COCOS ISLAND

Cocos Island is just off shore from the town of Merizo. Boats are available to take visitors to this privately owned island at a nominal fee. Among the favorite pastimes on the Cocos are swimming; scuba diving, lobstering, fishing, jungle walks and just plain relaxation.

#### WINDWARD HILLS GOLF COURSE

The Windward Hills Golf Course is the only non-military course on the island of Guam, and has 18 holes which will challenge anyone's ability. It is a privately owned club and no more than a 30 minute drive from downtown Agana. It is almost never crowded, and has a light plane airport within walking distance of the club house.

All golfere are welcome and the charges are nominal. Phoning ahead is a good idea.

#### 3 SPANISH BRIDGE, AGAT

This bridge, built in the 1700's, is the most nteresting of the several remaining stone bridges on Guam. During the yearly arrival of the ships from Mexico, the Spanish governor of Guam and his entourage would journey over the bridge on their way to Umatac. The bridge is no longer in use but is in an excellent state of repair considering its age.

#### (4) MAGELLAN'S MONUMENT, UMATAC

Magellan was met by a fleet of Chamorro sailing canoes when he sailed into the area in 1521, and named the island "Island of the Lateen Sails."

However, one of his boats mysteriously disappeared during his brief stay, so he promptly renamed Guam "Island of Thieves". Magellan himself, on the other hand, landed at Umatac to steal provisions. Though his stay was brief, it led to the eventual establishment of a Spanish colony and a unique island culture.


#### FORT NUESTRA SENORA DE LA SOLEDAD, UMATAC

The site of this fort offers an unparalleled view of Umatac Village. Remains of the old fort, built around 1810, make for fascinating exploration. A well-preserved Spanish sentry box still stands near the fort itself. One can imagine the importance attached to forts such as this during the period of Spain's colonization of Guam.


#### **(5) TALOFOFO FALLS**


Talofofo means "between the cliffs" in the native Chamorro language. Talofofo Falls is an outstanding tourist attraction which is considered so highly that private Guamanian interests are developing easy access to this scenic spot.


