#### HISTORY 59th NAVAL CONSTRUCTION BATTALION

Commissioned at Norfolk, Va., on December 29, 1942, the 59th Battalion left Norfolk February 26, 1943, and arrived at Hueneme on March 4. Leaving there March 21, the outfit sailed from San Francisco March 24. The Battalion arrived at Hilo, Hawaii, on the morning of March 30, with the exception of 2 officers and 113 men, who arrived on April 2. Activity began the following day on construction of roads so material could be brought in for immediate construction of barracks, mess hall, etc. When the Battalion arrived at Hilo, many men had to live in army huts. A record was made in transferring a shipload of lumber by working on a 24 hour basis. The Battalion was able to put the ship in position for reloading in less than 5 days, which involved handling more than 1 and a quarter million feet of lumber per day.

The Battalion's assignment was to construct a Naval Air Station at Hilo, to be operated jointly with the army and utilizing certain existing army installations. Some damage was done, though not serious, when a tornado hit Hilo and the air base on May 5.

In the year of construction work at NAS Hilo, the 59th CB learned methods of coping with unusual earth and foundation conditions which were encountered. Much terrain was composed of hard lava rock.

The major portion of the assignment for Hilo consisted of the widening of two 7,000 foot runways, and their paving with asphaltic concrete, the building of enlisted men's barracks, mess hall and galley, BOQ's, officers' mess and club, dispensary, warehouses, nose hangars, shops, ten 50,000 gallon prestressed concrete fuel tanks, water and electrical distribution systems, sanitary sewer system, operations buildings, administration buildings, access roads, ammunition, magazines and bomb storage hardstands. Buildings were largely of wood frame construction with concrete decks. More than one million cubic yards of lava rock, of which 90 percent required blasting, was moved. One hundred thousand tons of asphaltic concrete was mixed and placed on the widening of the runways and eight miles of access roads.

The base was put into operation two months ahead of schedule.

Coincidental with the work at NAS, a 20,000 man Marine Camp was built at Kamuela; water storage facilities were installed for the Coast Guard at Kailua; an emergency landing strip was put in usable operation at Suiter Field. A considerable amount of dredging was done in Hilo Harbor and storage buildings were erected for the Marine 6th Base Depot.

On September 15, 1943 Battalion Seabees rescued an Army fighter pilot from his burning plane. Two men of the 59th, MILNER, Raymond Edward PhM2c (273 South 4th East, Salt Lake City) and OLSEN, Allen Burns CM3c (Mt. Pleasant, Utah), returning from a movie at Hilo, Hawaii, reached the army airport just as the plane crashed on the field almost directly in front of them. They plunged through the flames and in the face of exploding ammunition, the two Seabees hoisted the fighter pilot, 2nd Lieut. Robert M Anderson out of the burning plane. The pilot, from the 72nd Fighter Squadron, AAF, recovered and resumed his duties as a combat flier. Battalion Cammander Paul L. Andrews read the citation signed by Admiral Nimitz in a ceremony on March 25, 1944, which took place in the wardroom of the Battalion's BOQ. The citation which was identical for both recipients, follows:

> "For extraordinary heroism on 14 September 1943, when he rescued an army Fighter Pilot from a burning plane which had crashed and burst into flames in making a night landing. He, assisted by another sailor and with utter disregard for his own safety, rushed to the burning plane, released the unconscious pilot and carried him to the safety amid exploding ammunition from the plane's magazine. He received burns on his legs, hands, and face. His courage throughout this episode was in keeping with the highest traditions of the naval service."

The 59th NCB was incorporated, in November 1943, as an integral part of the defense of the Hilo airport by military authorities on the island, because of transfer of army personnel. Seabees manned 2 anti aircraft positions, and the Battalion was organized so that all its automatic weapons were employed in beach defense positions. The same month the Battalion won 3 league championships in baseball, defeating all comers in the service leagues in the area.

The 59th NCB continued construction work on various projects at NAS Hilo and for Marine Camp A near Kamuela through March 1944, completing radio towers, administration building, warehouse, runway, paving, shops and vaults, assisted by the 99th NCB and available Marines. The 59th was relieved of duty at Hilo Hawaii by the 141st NCB about 18 April 1944. On April 21 the Battalion moved from Hilo to Pearl Harbor and upon arrival, began training and preparation for a forward movement. The Battalion sailed from Pearl Harbor in three echelons, leaving June 1, June 6, and June 18. The first echelon landed on Guam 27 July (which was D plus 6) with the first echelon of the garrison forces. Remaining units landed on July 30, August 2, 3, 10, 14 and 18.

Two men, CORLEY, J. W. CM1c 575 03 67 and Aliegra, F. C., CM1c 244 46 72, in the group which landed on Guam on July 27 from LST 71, received shrapnel wounds as a result of enemy action.

A major invasion assignment at GUAM was the rehabilitation of the island water systems. The Alamagosa water system, which was the largest and most important, was very badly damaged. The system was repaired with the use of salvaged materials, and put back into operation on D-plus-45 for service of some 60,000 personnel, besides furnishing 30,000,000 gallons of water per month to the fleet.

The assembling of pontoon docks and barges was another invasion assignment. The first dock in Apra Harbor was completed on D-plus-30, the SS HAUSIE being the first ship to dock.

Other invasion assignments included road and bridge reconstruction, camp construction, ship unloading and beach parties.

Major projects completed after the island was secure included:

1) Construction of Naval Supply Depot. This work consisted of the moving of 1,000,000 cubic yards of coral, the installation of a complete underground drainage system, erection of 263 40 - 100 SSAR warehouses with concrete decks, 2 102 x 500 wood frame transit warehouses, construction of an officers' camp, a 6,000-man enlisted men's camp and galley, office buildings, and other minor

work pertinent thereto. The Island Supply Officer, in a letter to Island Commander (31 July 1945) commended the excellent services rendered by the 59th for construction of the NSD, copies of which were sent to the Battalion Commander, 26th Regiment commander, and 5th Brigade commander.

2) Waterfront construction. This work included the assembling of 9 pontoon cargo docks in accordance with invasion plans for vital Apra Harbor cargo operations. Five of these docks were installed by the 59th, while the remaining four were installed by other battalions. During August there was sniper activity in the Battalion's working and camp areas, and one Japanese combatant was killed by personnel of the Battalion.

A typhoon in October of 1944 completely destroyed 7 of the 9 docks, and temporarily halted the discharge of cargo. This necessitated priority reconstruction of the destroyed docks, 3 of which were rebuilt by the 59th to insure early resumption of cargo discharging.

3) Concrete Pipe Plant. A plant was constructed from which 40,000 linear feet of bell and spigot precast concrete pipe was produced in sizes ranging from 8 to 18 inches.

4) Other construction work included construction at the Aviation Supply Depot, the Naval Operating Base Officers' and enlisted men's camps (complete with water borne sanitary sewers) the sanitary and storm sewerage system for the 2,000bed Naval Base Hospital No. 18, the operation and expansion of the Alamagosa water system, and operation of the 26-acre ABCD annex of S Sumay, plus assigned sections of road construction and maintenance. Numerous small construction projects, ranging from grading and road work to camp and industrial building construction were completed.

During December 1944 LAWRIES, Stewart Henry CM 1c 386 22 28 USNR was hiking in the hills about 2 miles north of the Maanot Reservoir, Guam, and came upon 2 Japanese in what appeared to be their hideout. Lawrie ran to the reservoir, a Marine patrol was called which joined him at the reservoir and in the hour that followed, the patrol established contact with the Japanese killing them both, Lawrie being responsible for one.

The 59th NCB terminated construction operations 31 August 1945, (with no surplus materials on hand) on receipt of verbal de-commissioning from the 5th Construction Brigade. On 15 September 1945 the 59th NCB was inactivated at Cuam.

From commissioning until May 19, 1944, the Battalion Commander was COMMANDER PAUL L. ANDREWS, CEC, USNR. Therafter the 59th's Commander was LCDR EARL W. CHIDESTER CEC, USNR, File 235783, Date of rank 7-12-43; address 31 Overhill Road, Fairmont, West Va.

- 26 Feb 43 NCB 59 departed from the U. S. Naval Construction Training Center, Norfolk, Virginia in three train sections.
- 4 Mar 43 The battalion arrived at the Advance Base Depot, Port Hueneme, California for advance training and outfitting.
- 21 Mar 43 The 59th NCB departed Port Hueneme for San Francisco.
- 22 Mar 43 NCB 59 arrived at San Francisco Port of Embarkation.
- 24 Mar 43 Seabees of the 59th Battalion left San Francisco for Hawaii.
- 30 Mar 43 USNCB 59 arrived at Hilo, Hawaii to begin construction of air strips and station facilities for the U. S. Naval Air Station to be jointly operated by the Army and Navy.
- 1 Jan A detachment from NCB 59, assisted by NCB 18, built a 2,000-man 15 Apr 44 camp for the 2nd Marine Division at Kamuela, Hawaii.
- 15 Apr 44 Construction of the Naval Air Station, Hilo, was completed by NCB 59 two months ahead of schedule.
- 18 Apr 44 NCB 141 relieved the 59th Battalion at Hilo.
- 20 Apr 44 The NCB 59 Seabees departed Hilo.
- 21 Apr 44 On landing at Oahu, the battalion reported for duty under the seventh U. S. Naval Construction Regiment at Pearl Harbor.
- 19 May 44 Commander Andrews was transferred to duty as officer in charge of the 7th Regiment and Lieutenant Commander Chidester, the former executive officer, replaced him as officer in charge of the 59th Battalion.
- 1 18 Contingents of the 59th Battalion departed Pearl Harbor.
