USS CONSTELLATION (CV-64) 1987 NARRATIVE COMMAND HISTORY

The highlight of USS CONSTELLATION's 1987 command history was her deployment to the Western Pacific and Indian Ocean from 11 April to 13 October. During this cruise, the 86,000-ton supercarrier commanded by CAPT Philip S. Anselmo steamed over 35,000 nautical miles and spent 139 days at sea, including 79 consecutive days in the Indian Ocean and North Arabian Sea in support of national objectives in that area.

Aboard CONSTELLATION, RADM Lyle F. Bull, Commander Carrier Group Seven and Battle Group Delta, commanded the first battle group tasked with support operations (EARNEST WILL Escort Operations) in the North Arabian Sea. A constant high tempo of operations resulted as Connie's aircraft provided airborne support during the escort of U.S. flagged merchant ships in their transits of the international waters of the Persian Gulf and Strait of Hormuz.

As the tankers and their surface escorts steamed through the Strait of Hormuz, CONSTELLATION and other battle group units took station in the North Arabian Sea. CONNIE's airborne early warning aircraft provided critical sensor information to the convoys and supporting units, ensuring early detection of potential threats. Fighter and attack aircraft provided airborne cover -- ready to intercept and defend in the event of hostilities. CONNIE's protective umbrella was airborne throughout the most critical phase of each transit. All of the aircraft of CVW-14, commanded by CAPT Dennis W. Irelan, were instrumental in CONSTELLATION's mission success. The success of the first five tanker escort missions, which CONSTELLATION supported, was in no small part due to the hard work and sacrifice of CONNIE's fine air wing, crew and all of Battle Group Delta.

While setting and maintaining high standards of material readiness throughout the deployment, CONSTELLATION spent 45 total days in various ports or at anchor, twice visiting Subic Bay in the Republic of the Philippines. Other ports of call included Perth, Western Australia; Pearl Harbor, Hawaii; and Diego Garcia, British Indian Ocean Territories.

CONSTELLATION began the year of this historical deployment undergoing Upkeep from I-15 January in her homeport of Naval Air Station North Island, San Diego, Calif.

From 16-20 January CONSTELLATION was at sea conducting Fleet Reserve Squadron Carrier Qualifications.

During an Upkeep period in San Diego from 21–27 January, the Senior Navy Steering Board conducted a safety assessment of all weapons elevators. The overall material condition was deemed "Outstanding."

Participation in READIEX 87-2 and BGE from 28 January through 11 February provided the opportunity to complete both a Quality Assurance Serviceability Test (QAST) and a Nuclear Weapons Operational Readiness Exercise (NOREX) very successfully.

Just prior to getting underway for a major deployment, CONSTELLATION spent 12 February through 10 April again in Upkeep, inport San Diego.

CONSTELLATION began her WESTPAC/IÓ deployemnt on 11 April. Through 01 May, CONNIE was underway heading for her first port visit and inchopping to the SEVENTH Fleet. From 02-07 May the carrier visited Subic Bay.

Enroute to the Indian Ocean from 08-18 May, CONSTELLATION conducted an Encounter Exercise with Malaysia and a Passage Exercise with Singapore. On 14 May CAPT Philip S. Anselmo relieved CAPT Melvin D. Munsinger as Commanding Officer.

CONSTELLATION was anchored in Diego Garcia from 19 May to 20 June, except for a short underway period in the North Arabian Sea from 24-28 May. During her stay in Diego Garcia, CONNIE conducted FLANCHOR OPS or air operations while at anchor. These operations maintained air wing qualifications during an inport period. CONSTELLATION was the first West Coast carrier to perform this type of operation and the first carrier ever to do so at Diego Garcia.

In June, CONNIE received special recognition as she was awarded the Secretary of the Navy's Environmental Protection Award in the large ship category for the

third consecutive year.

From 21 June to 26 August, CONSTELLATION underwent operations in the North Arabian Sea including WEAPONS WEEK and EARNEST WILL Escort Operations. During this period CONNIE completed her 270,000 fixed wing aircraft recovery on 23 June and launched her 51,000th aircraft from catapult Number Four on 23 July. Also, on 23 and 24 June, a mid-cruise Air Department inspection was conducted by COMNAVAIRPAC Handling team. No major discrepancies were reported.

After being relieved on station by USS RANGER, CONNIE headed for some well derserved liberty down under. Enroute to Australia from 27 August through 06 September, CONSTELLATION conducted a Battle Exercise with the Royal Australian Navy and Air Force.

From 07-13 September CONNIE made a port visit in Perth, Western Australia, then from 14-20 September she was enroute to Subic Bay where she made a port visit from 21-24 September.

From 25 September to 05 October, CONSTELLATION was enroute to Hawaii. Along the way, she made a short stop and anchor off Midway Island and conducted a highly successful Operational Propulsion Plant Readiness Examination.

CONNIE spent only one day in Pearl Harbor, 6-7 October, just long enough to load up 800 dependents for a Tiger Cruise which was conducted enroute to San Diego from 07-12 October.

Homecoming was on 13 October, when CONSTELLATION concluded her major

six-month deployment and returned to San Diego.

CONNIE wrapped up the year with an inport period in San Diego from 13 October to 10 November, and with the first part of an SRA period from 11 November to 31 December.

1987 Departmental Reports and Statistics

AIMD:

During the 1987 WESTPAC, within a given 48 hour period, AIMD processed and repaired over 300 components for embarked aircraft. The department realized a 14 percent improvement in their repair rate during the cruise, repairing in excess of 80 percent of the items inducted, and returned them to the air wing. The majority of the items that couldn't be repaired were either consumable or damaged beyond repair.

AIR:

During the 1987 WESTPAC, there were no accidents, every aircraft came back safely, and there were only two cases of foreign object damage where the cause couldn't be determined.

V-2's Equipment Availability Percentage for the second quarter of the year was 98.5 percent and for the third quarter of the year it was 98.1 percent. V-2 experienced a cracked piston in Number 3 Arresting Gear Engines during the year's third quarter and was fixed in Subic Bay.

V-3 Conducted over 5,500 moves from January to September, with no reportable crunches.

Recoating of V-4's five JP-5 tanks by SUPSHIP. COMFAIRWESTPAC Assistance Team came aboard to evaluate long run-outs on arresting gear number two. During the third quarter, V-4 issued 8,160,904 gallons of JP-5 and received 8,663,392 gallons during 18 UNREPS.

During the second quarter of the year, V-4's JP-5 stowage tank 8-39-2J was damaged during an UNREP, and there was possible fuel contamination in five of V-4's JP-5 Fuel tanks due to hydraulic spill from #3 elevator.

During the third quarter and while CONSTELLATION was in Subic Bay, Republic of the Philippines, work included waterbrake job on Cat 3, cyclinder slot measurement on Cat 1 and removal and replacement of the accumulator cylinder and piston.

CHAPLAIN:

During the 1987 WESTPAC, the Chaplain's Department processed over 1,000 American Red Cross messages.

COMMUNICATIONS:

During the 1987 WESTPAC, the Message Center processed as many as 1,900 messages and 99,000 total photocopies in a single day.

During the first quarter of the year, KW-46s installed to replace KG-14s, message traffic processing system installed to replace the Compuscan OCR system, Zenith 248 computer installed for message inrouting and logging, Xerox 1090 duplicating machines installed to replace Xerox 1075 machines, and message routing/distribution system (MRDIS) removed. 3-M inspection grade of 97.7%.

During the second and third quarter of the year, the Zenith 248 Computer installed to internally route message traffic. Manual intervention rate for outgoing message traffic reduced from 5.74% to 2.01%. Relay instruction removed by serving Communications facilities fleetwide before onward transmission to ship in order to reduce message transmission time.

DENTAL

During the 1987 WESTPAC, Dental Department saw an average of about 80 patients a day and operated on about 30 a day.

ENGINEERING

In February, Engineering was evaluated by the TYCOM Engineering Mobile Training Team as being ready for OPPRE, and Engineering passed the 3-M inspection. The MPA said, "No carrier has gotten a higher grade during this inspection."

In April when CONSTELLATION left on WESTPAC, the ship was CASREP-free, and during the first half of the cruise there had been fewer heat stress casualties in propulsion than the rest of the ship. In July, A, E, and R Divisions had zero outstanding trouble calls.

In September OPPRE was completed during the end of WESTPAC while anchored off the Midway Island. All five categories of assessment were determined to be effective with three of five (Material, Level of Knowledge and Administration) graded above average. After the PEB had only been aboard eight hours and had only logged 125 discrepancies (record low for aircraft carriers), the ship got underway. Getting underway on the first day of the exam is another record.

During WESTPAC, the ship's six flashtype distilling plants provided an average of 400,000 gallons of fresh water daily. The Flying Squad of R Division also battled only three major shipboard casualties during the cruise.

EXECUTIVE

The Public Affairs Office of X-I Division earned a first place Thomas Jefferson Award (DOD wide) and a first place CHINFO Merit Award (Navy wide) for the ship's newspaper for 1987. This is the second year in a row the newspaper has won a first place CHINFO Merit Award. Public Affairs also earned an honorable mention CHINFO Merit Award for the ship's familygram.

EXECUTIVE continued

During the entire year while at sea, Public Affairs operated the TV and radio stations 24 hours a day, published weekly television show guides, and published a daily newspaper, 120 total including 26 two-pagers, 77 four-pagers and 17 eight-pagers. In the newspapers, through mid September, Public Affairs has printed 70 CONSTELLATION-generated stories (of which 40 were written by Public Affairs personnel) and 174 photos (of which 47 were taken by Public Affairs personnel). There were three familygrams and four port brief booklets published during the year. During the WESTPAC, Public Affairs released 13 stories with photos to the media.

During the WESTPAC, The Print Shop also of X-I Division completed more than 8,200 individual projects using more than 2.5 million sheets of paper. This included a total of 9,000 copies of the ship's familygram. Daily jobs included the Green Sheet (375 copies daily), Load Plan (375), Knee-Board Cards (400), Air Plan (375), ship's newspaper (1,000) and the Plan of the Day (750).

While the ship was on station in the Northern Arabian Sea/Indian Ocean, the ship's Post Office of X-3 Division handled over 246,000 pounds of mail for CONSTELLATION and BATTLE GROUP DELTA. Throughout the deployment, the postal crew delivered in excess of 540,000 pounds of mail. Breakdown of sales from April through mid September:

From January through September, over 1,741 valuable items were registered under "Operation Identification" at the Ship's Investigation Office of X-4 Division. During the WESTPAC, during the Master-at-Arms' Urinalysis, 800 samples a month were taken.

MEDICAL

The most important accomplishment is the Command Inspection. For the second consecutive cycle, Medical won the most coveted Blue "M." Medical was certified by COMNAVAIRPAC to be 100% ready. Total number of patients seen during the year: 51,911 Navy and 452 USMC. Additional figures: zero deaths, 180 MEDEVACS and 50 surgeries.

During WESTPAC, the ship's pharmacy dispensed 11,000 medications, the laboratory provided over 8,100 diagnostic tests, the Aviation Medicine crew performed over 1,000 physical examinations, Connie's "hospital" housed over 300 outpatients, PMT performed approximately 1,263 audiograms, and X-ray performed over 1,000 radiographs.

The Laboratory does 300 tests per week, and the pharmacy fills approximately 350-400 prescriptions weekly.

SUPPLY

During the year, Supply was awarded the Supply Blue "E," awarded the COMNAVAIRPAC Food Service Excellence Award (second consecutive year), and was the only COMNAVAIRPAC carrier to meet all seven Readiness Goals, and did so for the last six months of 1987.

While deployed during the WESTPAC, Supply maintained a Mission Capable Readiness average of 88.5 percent and a Full Mission Capable Readiness average of 86.1 percent in support of 18,052 flight hours in a very arduous operating environment. Twenty-eight Underway Replenishments were made during the cruise, providing CONSTELLATION with 13,878,721 gallons of Aviation Fuel, 19,485,898 gallons of Propulsion Fuel, and 6,706 pallets of material. During this period Supply made 56,995 issues, processed 48,154 receipts, and made 2,485 return shipments. Range and Depth levels were rarely maintained/reached. Deployment averages were: AVCAL - 93.4/88.8, COSAL - 90.8/83.9 and RPOOL -99.5/93.7.

During 1987, Supply passed 3M and other inspections with flying colors and attained SMI scores of "Outstanding" in every division.

TRAINING

During 1987, CONSTELLATION was the runner-up for COMNAVAIRPAC's "Golden Anchor" award (retention program). The overall retention rates have been maintained since 1985. 106 counselors were trained during the WESTPAC in the Career Information and Counseling School on board. CONSTELLATION middleman positioned in Subic Bay during the cruise processed over 250 actions for the ship, CVW-14 and Battle Group Delta. A Career Information Counselor sent to Yokosuka, Japan for a detailer visit carried with him over 100 requests to process personally with the detailers.

There were 399 readiness exercises completed, which maintained CONSTELLATION's overall training readiness rating at a perfect 1.00 throughout the deployment.

CONSTELLATION had 824 participants in the September 1987 advancement examinations which resulted in 399 advancements.

Four full time college instructors taught three separate sessions for a total of 28 college level courses. 675 personnel completed Pace courses. Functional skill program included four courses completing 545 personnel.

WEAPONS

During the first quarter of the year, the department had a grade of 98.6 during the annual 3-M inspection, completed CV Nuclear Weapons SASS Team training course and rebuilt or rehabilitated over 2,000 pieces of weapons handling equipment including reachforks and bomb hoists.

During the second quarter of the year, Weapons completed an ammo CONREP with USS CAMDEN, completed 24 special weapons proficiency loads with various air wing squadrons and had one equipment casualty to a reachfork.

During Weapons Week, the department built and loaded over 75 tons of ordnance.

During the third quarter, Weapons completed 29 special weapons proficiency loads with various air wing squadrons, off-loaded all Indian Ocean turnover items to RANGER Battle Group and completed a conventional ordnance off-load to USS CAMDEN.

During the fourth quarter, the department completed a conventional ordnance off-load to USS MOUNT HOOD and a special weapons off-load while pierside at NAS North Island, San Diego, CA.

Total ordnance off-loaded during the year: 1,200 lifts and 30,000 tons.
