## HISTORY OF THE FIRST SPECIAL U. S. NAVAL CONSTRUCTION BATTALION

"In the fall of 1942 it became apparent that the Navy would be forced to organize special battalions of stevedores to handle the mountains of freight which had to flow over open beaches in the Pacific. The nature of the Pacific war made stevedoring at the advance bases as hazardous and difficult as construction. An unloading ship was a prime target for the enemy. Then all the normal difficulties of unloading were multiplied by the absence of piers in the forward islands. We had no piers for two reasons; there had been no time to build them; and until an island is made secure from enemy attack it is foolish to build piers, since they will only be destroyed by enemy bombs. This meant that when a freighter arrived at a place like Guadalcanal, she had to anchor offshore and unload her cargo onto heaving barges; then the barges ran to the beach, where the cargo had to be handled again onto trucks. This ship-to-shore process doubled the normal amount of stevedoring." 1.

"The CEC designated the stevedore battalions "Special" battalions and rushed plans for their creation. As with the first construction battalions, the need was so urgent that there was little time to train the first "Special". We had moved into Guadalcanal, and if that battle was to won we had to have men who would stick with those ships and unload them in spite of bombs, shells and weather.

To form the First Special Battalion, the CEC simply grabbed 95 men with stevedoring experience who had enlisted for service with the construction battalions, added 900-odd others who knew something about rigging and handling barges and small boats, and rushed the group to the Pacific where they were joined by the Second, Third, and Fourth Specials." 2.

The First Special U.S. Naval Construction Battalion was commissioned at Camp Bradford, Norfolk, Va., 16 December 1942. Lt. Comdr. W. T. Powers was Officer in Charge. The unit moved to Camp Peary, near Williamsburg, Va. on 17 December 1942. While at Camp Peary the battalion received training in advanced military and in stevedoring operations. In the latter part of December half the men were transferred to form the nucleus of the Second Special U.S.N.C.B. The remaining approximate 500 became known as the First Echelon of the First Special U.S.N.C.B. The First Echelon left Camp Peary for Port Huene on 1 January 1943. The time at Huene was spent in outfitting the unit and in military drill. Some of the personnel were granted a five day leave while at Huene.

The First Echelon left the U.S. on 3 February 1943 aboard the MS DAY STAR and SS TURNER. This Echelon, along with the 46th U.S. N.C.B. formed a part of Cub Two under the command of Commander Rochester.

The First Echelon, after a layover of approximately four weeks at Espiritu Santo, arrived at their destination of Guadalcanal, British Solomon Islands on 21 March 1943. The battalion lived in pup

tents and ate C rations for several days while a camp was being constructed. Camp construction was necessarily slow as the stevedore companies were immediately put to work unloading ships and only a small percentage of the men were used on camp construction.

The Second Echelon of the First Special U.S.N.C.B. was formed at Camp Peary, 17 January 1943. Lieut. L. K. Wood was Officer in Charge of the echelon. This unit left Camp Peary for Port Hueneme on 25 January 1943. Upon arrival at Port Hueneme the personnel were assigned to stevedore training and advanced military training and the unit was outfitted. No pre-embarkation leave was granted.

The Second Echelon of the First Special along with Aviation Repair Unit formed the Second Echelon of Cub 2 under Lt. Comdr. Parr as Commanding Officer. They embarked from U.S. on 4 March 1943 aboard SS MORMACWREN. After a layover of almost six weeks at Espiritu Santo the unit arrived at Guadalcanal 2 May 1943. Due to the fact that no tents were available on the island this echelon also lived in pup tents and subsisted on C rations for several days while their equipment was being unloaded and camp construction was going on.

The battalion equipment arrived at Guadalcanal 2 April aboard the SS LOUIS JOLIET. Before this equipment had been unloaded an aerial attack by a large number of Japanese planes forced all the ships to leave the harbour and return to Espiritu Santo. This delayed for about two weeks the arrival of necessary working equipment. At this time all ships were worked in the stream and cargo was brought ashore by pontoon barges and tank lighters.

"During the first three months in the Pacific the First Special handled 112,407 tons of cargo from 33 ships. During this time there were twenty-six air alerts and at least one very serious bombing raid." 3.

In August 1943 Commander Powers returned to the U.S. to take over a construction battalion and the command of the battalion was taken over by Commander William H. Yost. Commander Yost in time became Commander Cargo, Guadalcanal and Commander William C. Lamb became Officer in Charge of the First Special U.S.N.C.B.

The personnel of the battalion decreased due to fatigue caused by long and arduous work and tropical diseases, the most prevalent of which was malaria.

On 6 April 1944 the battalion was sent to New Zealand for a well earned "rest" leave. While in New Zealand the battalion personnel explored the country from one end to the other. The unit returned to Guadalcanal on 29 May 1944.

In early September 1944 a very happy communication was received. The text stated that the battalion was due to return to Uncle Sugar, where they arrived 1 October 1944.

While at Guadalcanal the battalion had received several letters of commendation both from the island command and from the masters of ships which they had worked, for work well done.

"Here is what the master of one transport wrote: "During our

emergency departure from Guadalcanal, we found ourselves critically short of men in the engine room. Through the kind cooperation of Lieutenant Gurry and his men, we secured seven men who acted as oilers and firemen, who did a most excellent job of helping us in our need."

"The master of a Liberty ship wrote: 'The manner in which the men of the First Special accepted duty during an attack on us by twelve enemy aircraft was unsurpassed. Gangs were organized as ammunition carriers, magazine loaders, and at fire stations. Some men took positions on the 20-mm. guns, some on the 3-inch gun, and some as corpsmen at the First Aid Station.'

Another master wrote: 'During the course of a raid, while enemy planes were forming for another dive on the ship, the First Specialists calmly removed broken booms and rigging from the hatches and lashed them to the deck for safety. During the night they stood guard watch, relieving the gun crews in order that they might be in best form when needed.'

Another skipper wrote: 'I wish to inform you that the stevedoring operation aboard this vessel was as fine, if not better, than any civilian stevedoring that I have witnessed in my fifteen years' experience. The cargo was handled carefully and at the same time with maximum dispatch.'" 4.

Upon returning to the U.S. the personnel of the battalion was granted a thirty day leave. After completion of this leave the battalion was ordered to Port Hueneme for training and outfitting, arriving there on the 19 November 1944, with Lieut. Comdr. J. Kask as Officer in Charge. While at Hueneme the battalion took up the slack of civilian stevedoring operations and loaded ships leaving for forward areas. This work and training continued until 1 March 1945 when the battalion was split into two sections, the First Section being ordered to New Caledonia and the Second Section being ordered to Espiritu Santo to do stevedoring work in connection with the "roll up" of these two bases.

The Second Section with Lieut. Charles J. Price as Officer in Charge arrived at Espiritu Santo on the 18 March 1945. This section has among its personnel 185 members of the original First Special. The remainder being made up of new replacements from boot camp and personnel who have seen service in France as members of other C.B. Units, some of whom were in on the Normandy invasion.

The battalion was assigned to the camp formerly occupied by C.B.M.U. 538. The camp is a quonset hut camp in a very nice location. This was very fortunate as the equipment sent out with the battalion was very incomplete, no tools or rolling stock were included in the original shipment. As the personnel of the First Special was nearly twice as large as the former occupants of the camp it was necessary to make several additions to the camp. Tools for this work were drawn from Public Works and Naval Supply Depot. Some rolling stock

was drawn from Public Works to fill in until the battalion equipment arrived. Reefers were not sent out and electrical generating equipment sent out was insufficient both of these items were furnished by Public Works.

A chapel, several quonset hut living quarters, a supply warehouse and many small construction projects were completed to make the camp adequate for the personnel and equipment.

The S.S. WILLIAM GREY, carrying the battalion equipment, arrived at Espiritu Santo 1 April 1945. The battalion began its stevedoring activities on this base at that date by unloading our own equipment. Many of the personnel were untrained in this type of work and as they had joined the battalion just a few days before our departure from the States, it required a few weeks of working together before a substantial degree of stevedoring efficiency was attained.

The battalion was assigned to work Alhena Landing and Pier Five but stevedoring work has also been done at Piers Two and Three, Pier Four and Seven, the two LST beaches and in the stream. Since starting work on 1 April 1945 until 30 June 1945 this activity has worked seventeen small craft and thirty-five ships, loading 3,787 tons and discharging 11,177 tons.

Some stevedoring equipment in the battalion complement was found to be insufficient, this included lift jitneys and dock tractors. Some of this type of equipment has been secured from units on the island.

Recreation for the battalion is provided through movies, library and athletics. Movies are shown every night in the Mess Hall and are well attended. Inter-battalion softball games provide a great deal of good natured rivalry. Games are hard fought but a source of pleasure to all. Before leaving the states a pool table was purchased from Welfare Funds. This piece of equipment is one of the most popular forms of recreation. The library, though small, is stocked with technical, historical and fiction books and is extensively used by men off duty.

The battalion left the U.S. approximately 4% under complement and due to medical and overage transfers since arriving at this base is now approximately 7% under complement.

Personnel in Sick Bay due to minor injuries and sickness averages approximately 4%. This leaves the personnel available for work about 11% below complement. Through the sacrifice of all but urgently needed work in each company we have been able to maintain the original number of gangs.

To offset this loss of personnel additional replacements have been requested.

- 1 Oct 1944 1st CB (Sp) with 23 officers and 610 men arrived Camp Parks. On 21 Aug 1944, 100 men were transferred to 6th CB(Sp). On 7 Sep 44, 25 men were transferred to 11th CB (Sp).

Second Tour of Duty

- 6 Mar 1945 1st CB (Sp), 1st and 2nd Sections, departed for overseas. 1st Section destined Noumea, 2nd Section destined Espiritu Santo. Dates of arrival not known.
- 1 Sep 1945 1st Section departed Noumea for Lingayen via Espiritu Santo combined with 2nd Section at Espiritu Santo.
- 5 Sep 1945 Battalion departed Espiritu Santo.
- 16 Sep 1945 Arrived Lingayen.
- 21 Sep 1945 Departed Lingayen for Saseba, Kyushu, Japan. Time of arrival unknown.
